Minister's Message

Listen more, draw on holy patience, and have faith

s I write this column I am very aware of my privilege today. I am thankful that I live in a quiet corner of suburban Ottawa, where semis and transport trucks have NOT been parked for the current demonstration on Parliament Hill. I am NOT losing sleep because of horns honking or lights flashing. I do NOT feel afraid to step out my door to do the necessary errands that keep our household working. I count this as a privilege, because I know some of you have had your home life or work life terribly disrupted. You will likely be receiving this ChurchPost more than a week after I am writing for it, so I am praying that resolution of the occupation has taken place, and that life has returned to "pandemic normal 4.0".

In the spring of 2020 one of my favourite comedians, Julie Nolke, started doing a series of short videos called *Explaining the Pandemic to My Past Self*. I am sure when she started it she never realized how much material it would generate. Or that it would go viral (20 million views and counting!). Or that she would become an "overnight success". After 13 years of study and casting calls and auditions and rejections, of course. You can listen to her tell her own story in this Ted Talk: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v= azujpl4tmE.

We often talk about "hindsight 20/20". There is new irony in those numbers that are shared by a perfect score in an eye test and the year we lost our ability to predict or see what was around the corner. Wouldn't you love to go back to early 2020 and tell your past self what to look out for, to stock up on yeast or to trim down your expectations for travel in the next few years?

How about some other aspects of your past life? Say you had the opportunity to go back several decades and inform your old attitude towards the 2SLGBTQ+ community,

or the racialized community. If you had the opportunity to enrich your previous faith journey with the faith questions and beliefs you have now in 2022, what would you say?

More importantly, do you think your past self would have listened? With the demonstration this week and the voices I have heard in the media, I am reminded once again how hard it is to change someone's mind, or heart, or path. It is an



incremental process that calls us to listen more than we speak, to draw on a deep well of holy patience, and to have faith in God who will lead us all to healing and justice and well-being.

And I would probably tell my 2003 self that we chose the right house in Ottawa. Thanks be to God!

Help for Centretown Residents

By the time you read this, it may be irrelevant. I hope so! Should you be a resident of Centretown, you should know there are volunteer groups set up to help people having a hard time during the trucker protest. If you are feeling frightened or anxious about walking alone to get groceries or other outdoor errands, there is help. A volunteer group called Safety Walks Ottawa (SafetyWalksOttawa@gmail.com) was started this month. It vets its volunteers and will send you two people to escort you to and from your home safely. The Good Companions Centre (https://thegoodcompanions.ca) can also help you. As well, there is an organization called Counselling Connect (https://www.counsellingconnect.org/) if you need to speak to someone.

We know, from the paper, TV and social media, that many residents are suffering during the trucker protest. In particular, BIPOC, aboriginal youth, LGBTQ2S+, Muslim and Jewish people, women alone or staying in women's shelters, and other vulnerable people are being verbally abused. Wearing a mask is a red flag, it seems. I participated in a Zoom call on February 4 called Outlasting the Convoy, chaired by a local MPP. Suddenly, someone on the call interrupted a young black woman invited to speak. It was a racist, expletive-filled rant, written multiple times in the chat column. Disgusting and alarming, and thank goodness it was just online. It gave me an insight, however, into how threatened some of our fellow citizens must feel when confronted by a protester.

Tips and Tricks for Using Rideau Park's YouTube Channel

any features in YouTube are meant to help, but may seem confusing. However, there a few simple things you can do to make things easier and to optimize your listening and viewing experience. This article is intended for people using the Rideau Park United Church YouTube channel, but it is broadly applicable for any YouTube users.



It is not always obvious how to find what you are looking for on YouTube. If you have never used YouTube before, simply go to "youtube.com" in your internet browser and use the YouTube search window to look for "Rideau Park United Church". But then you will have to browse through a long list of videos trying to find the specific one you are looking for. The search list will include not only all the videos on our channel, but many other videos, including ones that YouTube will suggest for you and that have nothing to do with Rideau Park.

You have two main options to shortcut the search process for a video:

1. Use an Address Link

- a. Ask someone to send you a link to the video that you want to watch, then simply click on the link in your email, or copy and paste the link into the address bar of your browser (FireFox, Safari, Internet Explorer, Chrome, Edge, etc.).
- b. With the video open in your internet browser, you can create your own bookmark and use that bookmark anytime later that you want to re-watch that video.
- c. To watch one of our two Distance Healing Circle videos, go to the Rideau Park website, specifically the Healing Circle page, to find the links: https://www.rideaupark.ca/programs/spirituality/rideau-park-healing-circle/. From that page, click on either of the two YouTube videos, as shown below in this excerpt from the Healing Circle page:

You are invited, in the comfort of your own home, to use either of the following YouTube video links to guide you through this healing time.

Distance Healing Circle (Classical music) – YouTube video Distance Healing Circle (New Age music) – YouTube video



2. Use YouTube Features

If you have a YouTube account, there are other handy features you may want to check out, including the *Save* button. With the *Save* feature, you can put your favourite videos into a *Playlist*, so you don't have to search through the whole channel looking for them. Your saved video playlists will appear when you select the *Library* view. Our Rideau Park YouTube channel already has pre-saved *Playlists* that sort our content and make things easier to find when you are browsing our channel, as

shown below.



Avoiding Ads

Rideau Park United Church does not invite advertisers to place ads on our channel, but last year YouTube changed their policy. Now ads can be placed on any videos published in the public space. One of our videos, in particular, has been attracting ads, starting soon after it surpassed 100 views, specifically the Distance Healing Circle (Classical music) video. Although you can usually press the *Skip Ad* button after a few seconds to move on to the actual video, it is possible to avoid the ads altogether if you can access a copy of the video in the unlisted section of our YouTube channel. Because of these ads, both of the Distance Healing Circle videos are now available in our unlisted section. Of course, to access them you have to have the link. The links to these unlisted copies are the ones provided on the Rideau Park Healing Circle webpage, as already described above.

Note: Rideau Park has no control over these ads and is not promoting anything.

Stopping Autoplay

If you are listening to a meditation video or a healing circle video, you probably don't want YouTube to launch immediately into another video that it picks randomly for you. To avoid this, select *Autoplay* to Off. This widget is usually found along the bottom of the window when you pause the video or move the cursor to hover over the video.
