Minister's Message

Living with Uncertainty

For a long time, I thought of the pandemic as temporary. A return to life as I knew it, where hugging a friend wasn't a luxury, and attending a funeral didn't put you in danger, was always just around the corner. This past spring, I thought we'd arrived at herd immunity and freedom from masking and other restrictions would be here soon. I was sure of it. Not anymore. Reality has replaced wishful thinking.

COVID is still with us. Eighteen people who were on the tour I took of Newfoundland in July tested positive for it. Within the past month, two family members did, as well. What's changed is my attitude toward it. Like many people, I'm coming to view COVID as more like the seasonal flu. I'd prefer not to catch it but I'm not taking as stringent measures to avoid it as I did in the beginning. I'm learning to live with a certain level of risk.

Humans have always lived with a degree of uncertainty. It's part of our nature as temporal, corporal beings subject to accident and illness. Most of the time though, thoughts of harm coming our way are kept at the back of our minds. The pandemic moved those thoughts forward. Despite vaccinations and booster shots, we know COVID can still find us.

Continuing uncertainty is hard to cope with, especially when our personal safety is involved. But since that seems to be our lot for a while yet, what can

we do to make it less stressful? For one thing, we can focus on those things in our lives that we have certainty about: the affection that exists in our families; the support of friends; the comfort of daily rituals and familiar routines; and the sense of purpose and hopefulness we experience as followers of Jesus. With these good things in place, let's try to hold positive thoughts



about the future, to enjoy small pleasures in the moment and, yes, even to dream a little of a time when life will return to normal.

Let's attempt to make our lives as rich and full as we can, while still exercising the level of caution our age and personal health situation warrant.

Let's help each other get through this!

Healing Pathway

hat is it? Healing Pathway is a United Church program that develops the skills and gifts of healing hands within the Christian tradition, and fosters development of healing ministries in congregations and other communities. It has been active in Canada for over 30 years.



How does it work? The Healing Pathway practitioner serves as a channel for God's grace and healing energy. Practitioners are not the source of the healing energy; they are merely the instrument. The aim is to restore balance and harmony within the energy system and thus enable the natural self-healing processes within us.

How does it help? A Healing Pathway session can:


- ◆Facilitate healing after injury, surgery or an illness
- Help prepare for a surgery
- ◆Provide relief from pain, including chronic pain
- ◆Speed recovery from cancer treatments
- ◆Provide comfort and spiritual support in times of stress
- ◆Promotes well-being on all levels: physical, emotional, mental and spiritual

Appointments: In a typical session, two or more practitioners work with you in a private setting for anywhere from 15 to 45 minutes. The receiver can be sitting or lying down. The practitioners never work alone, unless a family member can be present during the session. There are no fees, and you do not have to be a member of the Rideau Park congregation to receive healing prayer. Anyone can make an appointment.

Rideau Park is currently offering appointments on Thursday afternoons between 12:30 and 2:30pm.

Exceptions: Healing Pathway does not replace traditional medicine and health care. Healing Pathway complements traditional medicine and health care by working at the energy level to expedite the healing process and the natural ability of the body to heal itself.

Basic Income Now

Anyone passing by Rideau Park Church this summer will have seen the **BASIC INCOME NOW** signs in front of the church. These signs have been posted by the Social Action and Outreach Committee to remind folks that the United Church of Canada has for many years endorsed the concept of a basic liveable income for all Canadians. Additionally, this past May, Rideau Park sponsored a webinar, hosted by Rev. Elizabeth Bryce, and organized by Basic Income Ottawa, to explore the need for a basic liveable income for Canadians.



What is **Basic Income** about? The ongoing effort to achieve a Guaranteed Livable Income for those

in need is part of a Canada wide movement, supported by numerous groups at the national, provincial, and municipal levels. These groups are coordinating their efforts to create a groundswell of support to ensure that we all have enough money to meet basic requirements for food, housing, health care, and community transportation. Check out Basic Income Canada, Ontaviolegy: Ontario Basic Income Network, and Ottawa Basic Income Guarantee for more information.

As individuals, we can also influence decision-makers to support this cause. We want to encourage you to consider these suggestions to support a basic liveable income for us all:

- 1. Donate the cost of a **Basic Income Now** sign (\$10) through the Social Action and Outreach Committee at Rideau Park. These signs can be displayed on church and private property to create awareness of our ongoing community support for everyone to have enough money to live on. During national, provincial, and municipal elections, these signs may also be loaned out to political candidates from any political party who declare themselves allies in establishing a guaranteed livable income. Contact administrator@rideaupark.ca if you want to purchase a sign.
- 2. Check out the slate of candidates on your local election ballot and consider whether they are supporters of a guaranteed livable income/basic income. Across Canada, there are both candidates and elected government members from all major political parties who individually support the concept of a guaranteed basic income, especially when implemented without taxing the majority of Canadians. - 3. Show your support for Bills C-223 and S-233, which recommend a national program with regional differences in the cost of living for Canadians over the age of 17 to realize a Guaranteed Livable Basic Income. You can do this by writing an email or using the UBI Works online "Contact your MP" template. Please c.c. takeaction@united-church.ca.
- 4. Request free 2"x2" square Basic Income Now stickers to place on the back of your cell phone or other visible locations to start discussions on the importance and value of this initiative. Have fun meeting new people who are curious to learn more about the benefits of ensuring people have enough money to live on. Contact administrator@rideaupark.ca for a sticker.
